RALLY DEPOSITS

Having experienced in 2016 a record number of members booking onto rallies and then cancelling at the last minute, or even worse just not turning up, a unanimous decision was taken by the membership that in future all rally bookings will require a deposit.

During the last few years a change in the type of venue requested by members has meant that we have moved away from farm fields to mainly licensed sites, to enjoy facilities such as hook-up. This has brought changes to the way the Club runs, often with large deposits being paid to secure a rally booking two years in advance. The Rally Secretary and Rally Officers are now dealing with professional business owners and site

managers who require firm numbers several weeks in advance of our arrival. Once told the number of outfits booked, those pitches are reserved and additionally there is an expectation of payment of the promised amount. We have as a club entered into a contract with the site, and there may come a time when a site demands full payment for all reserved bookings. If this had happened at one rally it would have cost the Club in excess of a thousand pounds. This obviously cannot be allowed to happen and members must now take responsibility for their individual bookings.

The following will now apply: -

All bookings, unless special terms apply e.g. Isle of Wight Rally, must be made using a rally slip and this is to be accompanied by a cheque made out to The Welton Owners Club for £20. Bookings will not be accepted without this paperwork.

When you arrive at the rally, the Rally Officer will hand you back your cheque and you will pay the full amount of site and rally fees in cash as normal.

Should you cancel your booking before the "book before date" in the rally book your cheque will be destroyed by the rally officer and not cashed.

If you do not attend the rally or if you cancel after the "book before date" when the rally officer has given final numbers to the landowner your cheque will be cashed. If a site demands that the Club makes full payment for your reservation, you will be asked to repay that same amount to the Welton Owners Club.

Please note that "book before" periods vary and reflect the rules of individual sites.

Linwater Caravan Park Edinburgh

Linlithgow Palace was one of the principal residences of the monarchs of Scotland in the 15th and 16th Centuries. Although maintained after Scotland's Monarchs left for England in 1603, the palace was little used. The palace burned out in 1746 and is now a visitor attraction in the care of Historic Scotland.

Blackness Castle is a 15th Century fortress near the village of Blackness on the south shore of the Firth of Forth.

It was built, probably on the site of an earlier fort, by Sir George Critchen in the 1440's. At this time, Blackness was the main port

serving the Royal Burgh of Linlithgow, one of the main residences of the Scottish Monarch.

On a few occasions, we all gathered together to have a chat with tea and cakes provided by the rally marshal's while discussing the quiz results. On the Friday night, we had fish and chips delivered and on the Sunday, we all went to the local pub for lunch, an excellent rally. Thanks to Dave and Tracy for all their hard work.

ROAST DINNER.

Parsnip and Lemon Cupcakes.

Ingredients

- 150g plain flour
- 1.5 teaspoon baking powder
- Pinch of salt
- 165g caster sugar
- 2 eggs
- 150g sunflower oil
- Half teaspoon vanilla extract.
- 150g grated parsnip
- Zest of 1 lemon.
- To decorate.
- 200g unsalted butter
- 400g icing sugar
- 2 grated balls of stem ginger
- 2 tablespoons of ginger syrup

1. Preheat oven to 180c/160c fan/gas 4 and line a 12 hole muffin tin with cupcake cases
2. Sieve together the flour, baking powder and salt and make a well in the centre
3. In a separate bowl whisk together the caster sugar eggs and sunflower oil and vanilla extract, then pour into the well of the dry ingredient and mix thoroughly.
4. Finally add the grated parsnip and lemon zest and mix until fully combined.
5. Transfer the mixture into a piping bag which prevents the cake mix from dribbling and pipe evenly into the cupcake cases.
6. Bake for 20 mins or until a skewer can be inserted and then removed cleanly.
7. Leave cakes to cool before decorating
8. To decorate:- Place the butter and icing sugar into a food processor and whizz until full combined and pale in colour. Using hand beaters or electric mixer is also fine.

9. Next add the grated ginger and ginger syrup and whiz until full incorporated.
10. Transfer the butter icing into a piping bag fitted with a wide star nozzle and then decorate cupcakes with a generous spiral of icing.
